Dear CoosWA Supporter,

We sincerely hope this finds you and your family safe and well.

Thanks to the support of people like you and our local, state, and federal partners, we were able to make a positive difference to Coos County this year through over 1.75 million dollars in financial support! All the money we receive through grants and donations goes directly to improving watershed conditions in our basin, helping our ecosystems, community, and economy to thrive.

Below are a few highlights of what our staff, board, and partners worked together to accomplish in 2022:

- Collaborated with 15 tribal, local, state, and federal organizations to complete the Coos Basin Coho Strategic Action Plan. This planning effort immediately led to securing over 11 million dollars from the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board for coho recovery efforts in the Coos basin over the next six years. This Focused Investment Partnership funding will be leveraged with an additional eight million in matching funds from partners. This is a very exciting, strategic investment in the health of the Coos watershed, coho recovery, and the Coos County economy.
- Worked with private landowners and an array of partners to begin implementing the Kentuck Creek Habitat Restoration Project. This year, our restoration contractor upgraded four road crossings, re-meandered over 3,000 feet of mainstem and tributary channel and placed logs with rootwads in key areas throughout the newly re-meandered reach. This winter, crews will install fences and begin planting the newly developed riparian buffers, and next summer we will establish three freshwater wetland ponds for additional habitat.
- Seasonally employed four young adults—who are currently pursuing or recently completed a natural resources degree—on our road survey, fish salvage, nursery maintenance, and noxious weed crews.
- Employed six local youth on our summer restoration crew, who spent their summer surveying vegetation, removing invasive species, constructing livestock fencing along creeks, helping survey and salvage fish, caring for plants in our native plant nursery, collecting seed and maintaining riparian plantings at restoration sites across the county.
- Continued essential partnerships and efforts to control noxious weeds and encourage replacing with native plants, including expanding our nursery capacity—now over 20,000 native trees and shrubs a year.

Our most challenging projects are often special opportunities that don't have ready grant sources—that's where your help is most needed. Through your indispensable contributions last year, we were able to:

- Replace our hard-working crew truck that every CoosWA program utilizes.
- Support local professional development in fisheries science through paid coho salmon monitoring internships.

• Award the sixth annual Teddy Villers Natural Resources Scholarship to local college student Aubrey Thorsen. This scholarship honors the life of Teddy Villers (Oct. 7, 2004 – Sept. 4, 2015), son of Mark and Adela Villers, who had a strong curiosity and deep passion for the natural world. We award it each year to a Coos watershed individual who exemplifies the spirit of the award and is pursuing education in the field of natural resources.
